## Demonstrated influence on policy and practice

Nick Glozier advised the NSW Health and Safety Forum (part of SafeWork NSW) on research priorities.

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Peter Rankin invited by the Australian Department of Education, Skills and Employment to provide expert advice on causal modelling using observational data (15/03/2023). Guided discussion led to refined agreement on principles and practice to be used in upcoming analytical work undertaken by Department.

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Matthew Curry and Peter Rankin delivered two x 4 half-day workshops (4 days FTE) on longitudinal data analysis to New South Wales Department of Education (12/09/2022 and 17/10/2022). Techniques learned by Department to be implemented in ongoing analytical work using internal longitudinal databases.

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In 2022 the Life Course Centre provided a coordinated Centre-wide submission to the Australian Government Department of Treasury Employment White Paper – Consultation. This submission led to a follow-up meeting with the Australian Government Department of Treasury to provide further consultation on the Treasury Employment White Paper.

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Marion Vidal-Fernandez led an online event to improve the visibility of women in science by improving their Wikipedia pages together with other researchers in any field. 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12 July 2022: Barbara Broadway and Guyonne Kalb participated in a discussion and Q&A session in relation to the Breaking Down Barriers report “From Partnered to Single: Financial security over a lifetime”, organised through Eliza Sullivan (Government relations, University of Melbourne) by the Office for Women - Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet. Around 20 staff members from PMC attended to discuss our findings.

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4 October 2022: Consultation with Treasury on analysis of the care sector. Professor Kalb was invited by Riki Polygenis, Assistant Secretary, Fiscal and Monetary Policy Branch, and spoke with Stephen Elias, Matthew Larkin, Omid Mousavi, Daniel Silva Withmory and Rachel Zhang from Treasury. They discussed modelling work around childcare and aged care, including appropriate frameworks and methodologies to be using.

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27 October 2022: Professor Kalb presented at and contributed to a Policy Roundtable with representatives from the Council of Single Mothers and their Children and the Victorian Department of Education and Training that was facilitated by VCOSS. Professor Kalb was invited because they had seen her present on the Breaking Down Barriers report “From Partnered to Single: Financial security over a lifetime” report at an earlier event.

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Professor Baxter is a member of the Council for the Committee for Economic Development in Australia. The council meets about four times per year and regularly invites government or policy makers to attend and discuss key developments. Professor Baxter presented about Life Course Centre research at the Council in March 2022. As a result, the Centre was subsequently invited to talk to Treasury about the White Paper on Employment. We also made a submission to the White Paper.

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In June 2022, the research team met with the Lives Lived Well Research Group (a group of research, clinical and consumer staff) to present the findings of the Sleep in Recovery Study. One of the key findings of this



research was the influence of sleep regularity on mental health outcomes during live-in rehabilitation. We provided some recommendations at this meeting for improving sleep regularity through morning exercise and natural light exposure (to reset the body clock). Following this meeting, LLW implemented an organisation wide change in their live-in rehabilitation clinical programming that included a pre-breakfast exercise session in the outdoors.

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Janeen Baxter, Jack Lam, Yanshu Huang and Juliana Goncalves presented their findings on Growing up in New Zealand research on maternal health and child wellbeing in Feb 2022. Agencies present were Oranga Tamariki and Social Wellbeing Agency. The report included advice on the GUINZ design, and Indigenous Data Sovereignty best practice. The report was accepted. Janeen Baxter, Martin O'Flaherty and Yanshu Huang are also involved with colleagues from COMPASS, the University of Auckland in a major NZ Life Course Study on chronic illness and employment outcomes using the NZ Integrated Data Infrastructure (the Lifecourse Project). In Nov 2022, Janeen Baxter and Yanshu Huang attended and presented at a workshop in Christchurch on the project that included representatives from the National Science Challenge Board. Janeen Baxter has subsequently been invited to participate and present at a two-day workshop in Wellington on Data Infrastructure in New Zealand in March 2023 that was attended by representatives from all of NZ's main statistics and policy agencies.

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Janeen Baxter, Alice Campbell, Yanshu Huang and Rennie Lee were invited to participate in regular roundtables with the Workplace Gender Equality Agency to hear updates and share research with the Agency and various stakeholders.

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Janeen Baxter, A. Abigail Payne, Wojtek Tomaszewski and Francis Mitrou were invited to participate in a Social Science Research Infrastructure Roundtable at ANU, and subsequently invited to participate in the development of the Academy of Social Sciences Decadal Plan for Social Science Infrastructure. A/Prof Mitrou and A/Prof Tomaszewski are members of the Steering Committee for the plan.

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Nick Glozier was an expert evidence reviewer (and presenter at the initial meeting in Geneva) of the WHO's Guidelines for Mental Health at Work published in September 2022. This was based on his work on disclosure, stigma and interventions to improve workplace mental health. Janeen Baxter, Hayley Christian and Abdullah Mamun were invited participants in the WHO round tables on healthy ageing over the life course. Janeen Baxter was subsequently invited to lead a component of the healthy initiative around administrative data.

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Translation of research into policy & practice - PLAYCE data were used in the 2018 and 2022 Active Healthy Kids Australian Report Card (led by Hayley Christian).

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In October 2022, A/Prof Wojtek Tomaszewski delivered a session on equity in higher education to the Australian Department of Education via a webinar for the Departmental Staff. The session was facilitated by the Equity policy team in the Department and attended by over 160 Departmental Staff. A/Prof Tomaszewski provided an overview of two projects undertaken in the higher education equity space: Review of Identified Equity Groups and the Effects of Cumulative Disadvantage in Higher Education, while also highlighting the work coming out of the Life Course Centre Flagships Project on using integrated administrative data to investigate educational equity over the life course.

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We have engaged closely with the Office of the National Data Commissioner (ONDC) since its establishment within the Australian Government Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet in 2018. We were involved in

all stages of the ONDC Data Sharing and Release Legislative Reforms, making submissions to the 2018 and 2019 consultations and on the Draft Bill in 2020. Following this extensive consultation period, the legislation for the Data Availability and Transparency Act 2022, a world-class scheme for sharing government data backed by strong safeguards, was passed by the Australian Parliament in March 2022.

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Research by Life Course Centre economists from The University of Sydney School of Economics and the Melbourne Institute: Applied Economic and Social Research at the University of Melbourne - including Deborah Cobb-Clark, David Ribar, Melissa Bubonya and Ferdi Botha - was referenced in a major new report from the Grattan Institute, released in May 2022, titled 'No one left behind: Why Australia should lock in full employment'.

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In 2022, the Australian Government Department of Treasury, in its October 2022 Budget, included a new statement as the foundation for a conversation about how to measure what matters to Australians in relation to wellbeing reporting. This first step towards progressing 'a wellbeing budget' follows extensive outputs by the Life Course Centre since its formation highlighting the importance of including and measuring wellbeing in relation to the performance of the Australian economy. Our recent outputs in this field include a 2021 report, requested by our partner the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW), that included a review of Australia's current wellbeing indicator framework, a comparative analysis of international frameworks, and areas to add, remove, amend or improve indicators. Our researchers also contributed a chapter on 'The social determinants of wellbeing' in AIHW's latest Australia's Welfare report in 2021.

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We worked closely with the organisers of Anti-Poverty Week in 2022 to provide them with research for their advocacy efforts during Anti-Poverty Week in October 2022. As 2022 marked the 20th year of Australia dedicating a week to act on poverty, the organisers requested that we provide specific research on single parent families over the past 20 years. This research showed the risk of financial hardship for single mothers was more than double that of partnered mothers, and this has been the case for 20 years, and also proposed a set of practical solutions to address this problem. Our research on single parent families was promoted via a joint Anti-Poverty Week media release and media briefing that generated strong exposure, including on ABC Radio National, ABC 730, The Guardian, The Monthly and Channel 10. It was also highlighted by Anti-Poverty Week Executive Director and member of our Advisory Committee Toni Wren at a Committee for Economic Development of Australia (CEDA) webinar that included Amanda Rishworth, Minister for Social Services, and Anne Hollands, National Children's Commissioner.

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Matthew 'Tepi' McLaughlin TKI-UWA was involved in the Asia-Pacific Society for Physical Activity response to the Australian Government Budget and Physical Activity Briefing Note to the Health Minister in 2022.

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Janeen Baxter and Martin O'Flaherty were invited by the Disability Royal Commission to provide expert advice. Due to confidentiality agreements, we are unable to disclose or discuss the nature of the advice.

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From a global perspective, an emerging partnership between the Life Course Centre and the World Health Organisation (WHO) began to develop in 2022. Our Director Professor Janeen Baxter was invited to present to an online 'kick-off' meeting for WHO's new focus on healthy development and ageing over the life course, attended by 118 participants from all six WHO regions. The Life Course Centre and our life course approach were featured in a subsequent WHO report, and we will continue to be involved in this ongoing WHO initiative.

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The Life Course Centre is achieving change through its support of the Parenting and Family Research Alliance (PAFRA) and its International Congress on Evidence-based Parenting Support (I-CEPS) to be held in

2023. PAFRA, incorporated in 2022, has received financial and in-kind support from the Life Course Centre for its mission to enhance collaboration between researchers, program developers, policy makers, service providers and consumers in evidence-based parenting support. Its I-CEPS global congress, to be held virtually over three days in June 2023, will bring together key national and international stakeholders to advance research, policy, and practice in the field of parenting and family programs. The I-CEPS outreach strategy has attached strong sponsorship support from government, non-government, community and research partners and over 400 presentation submissions, including 66 symposia, from 47 countries.

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Matthias Kubler presented some recent work on disadvantage factors in accessing, and succeeding in, higher education studies at the Widening Tertiary Participation Practitioner Seminar on 24 June 2022, which was attended by about 70 practitioners, administrators and researchers from Queensland universities.

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Matthew 'Tepi' McLaughlin TKI-UWA was involved in the Three Transport Priorities initiative in the lead up to Australia's Federal Election in 2022. Three Transport Priorities are evidence-based, tangible transport solutions – based on Lower Default Speeds Limits, 1500m School Zones and E-Bike Purchase Subsidies – that were prepared specifically for the 2022 Australian Federal Election. The Three Transport Priorities was an initiative of the Asia-Pacific Society of Physical Activity, in partnership with WeRide Australia and an alliance of public health, transport, education and climate organisations, and was presented to representatives of The Liberal Party and The Labor Party at Parliament House in Canberra in February 2022. The Three Transport Priorities was awarded the '2022 Excellence in Health Promotion Practice' award by The Australian Health Promotion Association WA Branch.

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## New Research Projects Co-designed with Partners

**LCC\_2022\_79 Health, Home, Hope** is in conjunction with Micah Projects, and includes an exhibition of photographs taken by people who have experienced homelessness.

**LCC\_2022\_85 Understanding Social Connections in Social Housing** aims to understand how to enhance social connectedness through physical and social infrastructures, in conjunction with the St Vincent de Paul Society.

**LCC\_2022\_95 Tati Tati Agent Based Modelling** is a part of a research collaboration with Tati Tati Traditional Owners to explain the relationship between the natural environment and wellbeing of Indigenous Tati Tati Traditional Owners and community living on the Milloo, the Murray River, near Robinvale in Victoria. This specific project involves developing system dynamic models that show a range of intergenerational outcomes that can be communicated to different audiences including Traditional Owners and policy makers.

**LCC\_2022\_99 The Urban Access Study** is in partnership with the National Growth Areas Alliance. It is developing a novel approach and dynamic tool to assess access to transport, education and health services.

**LCC\_2022\_102 Educational Pathways** and Intergenerational Outcomes was co-designed with the Australian Government Department of Education, and also involves the Australian Government Department of Social Services. It investigates the role of social disadvantage on education pathways and employment outcomes, including the impact of intergenerational factors, to help governments target education policies to support a more equal and productive society.

## New Interventions

**LCC\_2022\_59 WAACHS Data Linkage Study** is a partnership between researchers, the Aboriginal community and government to provide evidence for policy and practice addressing high priority health conditions for Aboriginal children and families. It has recently received NHMRC funding and will proceed under that grant in 2023.

**LCC\_2022\_66 DEBPT** aims to develop an (AI) agent to support the process of skill training and assessment. By adopting cutting-edge AI technologies, we aim to develop an automated feedback system (AFS) to mimic the role of a trainer to assess trainees' consultation skills and provide them with appropriate feedback. A version of this project was described in the Centre application, but technological advances have led to a significant re-visioning.

**LCC\_2022\_78 Sharp Minds** is a cross-faculty, multidisciplinary research which will seek to assess the effectiveness of a brief 4-session educational and skills building program (Better Sleep) at improving sleep health and mental well-being in first year university students.
